

What's Happening in City Council?

During the month of January the City Council will meet on the first Wednesday, January 4th and the third Wednesday, January 18th. Council meetings start at 6:30 pm and are held in the meeting room at the North Logan Library.

During meeting on January 4th the Council will try to fill any vacancies in appointed positions to serve the city. They will also revisit the proposed development agreement for the Brook Haven Senior Living development on 400 E. and 19th to 20th N. They will also be considering an ordinance rezoning about 2.5 acres at 1700 N 200 E, rezoning it from Community Commercial (CC) to Residential Multi-Family (RM). Also during this meeting the council will begin to discuss a proposed ordinance that makes amendments to the subdivision ordinance designating the Planning Commission as the land use authority for North Logan City.

During meeting on January 18th the Council will hold a public hearing to receive input on a proposed revisions to the city's FY2017 budget. This is a typical mid-year correction to the budget. They also plan to consider approval of the proposed revised development agreement and concept plan for the Canyon Gates Subdivision, the development of the remaining 120.79 acres into a maximum of 233 lots located between 1600 and 2200 E and 2000 and 2400 N. They also plan to continue discussion of the concept plan for the Wheatland Hills residential subdivision. This subdivision is about 155 acres, 118 lots to be located at approximately 2200 E and between 3100 and 3400 N.

The official council agendas as they are posted at the city office and on the State of Utah Public Notice Website at <http://www.utah.gov/pmn/index.html>. The Herald Journal is given a copy of the official agenda as well and they normally print it in the newspaper a day or two before the meeting.

More on Illicit Discharge...

What is an illicit discharge? Stormwater regulations define an "illicit discharge" as "any discharge to a municipal separate storm sewer that is not composed entirely of stormwater."

Basically, only rain water and snow melt are allowed in the City's storm drain system.

The following are examples of an illicit discharge:

- The sewage line from a house or business is incorrectly connected to the storm system
- There is a cross-connection between the sewer line and storm drainage system. This can be from an old connection that was never plugged or the plug has deteriorated, or it can be caused by filtration from leaking or cracked pipes
- Improper disposal of auto and household toxics (for example, pouring used automotive oil, or radiator discharge, into a drain on the street)
- Laundry or car wash discharge flows or is directly connected (floor drain, gutter etc.) to the storm sewer system
- Animal waste from agricultural practices
- Wastes from carpet cleaning, pressure washers
- Sediment and pollutants from construction sites
- Hosing down roads and sidewalks

As we enter into the winter months you may begin to see more wildlife in and around your residences, mostly in the form of mule deer. Your heart may go out to them being outside on these cold winter nights and you may be tempted to feed them. Please do not feed the deer. In an effort to manage our urban deer herd population the Division of Natural Resources mandated that our city pass an ordinance restricting the feeding of deer. The ordinance reads:

16-605 Unauthorized Feeding Of Deer

"The attracting and feeding of deer within the City limits results in the deposit of refuse, debris, fecal matter and other offensive substances and in the attraction of predatory wildlife. It also creates traffic hazards, property damage, and nuisance and annoyance of other persons. Unless otherwise expressly permitted by law, no person shall deposit, place, distribute or leave any fruit, grain, hay, vegetable, salt, or other food, of any kind or nature, with the intent to attract or feed deer on public or private lands.

A. A property owner shall immediately remove any materials placed on their property by others in violation of this section.

B. There shall be a rebuttable presumption that the placement of fruit, grain, hay, vegetable, minerals, salt, or other food in aggregate volume of more than one-half gallon at a height of less than six feet (6') off the ground, or in any drop feeder, automatic feed, or similar device regardless of height, is for the purpose of feeding deer in violation of this section. Naturally growing plants, gardens, residue maintained as a mulch pile, and bird feeders designed or placed to limit access to deer, are not prohibited under this section.

C. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to any resident or agent of the City authorized to implement a wildlife management program and who possesses the necessary permits from the State of Utah, nor shall it apply to any public officer or public employee in the performance of his duties. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the feeding of domestic animals.

D. The Chief of Police or the Animal Control Officer may authorize temporary feeding for the purposes of counting the deer population, baiting deer traps, or other public purposes. City officials shall issue a written warning for the first offense under this section. Thereafter, offences shall be subject to standard procedures for ordinance violators. The violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction"



Winter Parking Restrictions Now in Effect!

We would like to remind everyone that the winter parking ordinance (11-604) is now in effect. This means vehicles/trailers/RV's, etc., cannot be parked on city streets, curbs and shoulders between **1:00 am - 5:00 am** on any day. Please let your family and friends know, as well as your renters if you have them, as citations will be

issued during these hours. Do not put your garbage/recycling out the night before if it looks like there will be snow during the night. During other hours, if it is snowing, or beginning to snow, we would appreciate you not parking on the streets so that our snow plows can keep your roads clean and safe for you and your family. Thank you.

The best thing that can be done for the deer during the winter is to let them forage naturally. This will keep them healthier in the long run. Thank you for your help. During the winter months our animal control officer is available to present an animal control presentation to groups or families. You can choose from a number of subjects that may interest you. Subjects may include: Avoiding vicious animals, dog/cat bites, rabies, animal neglect, choosing the right pet, animal trapping, stray animals, deer problems, danger with wild animals or general animal control. 




NOTE: Bring the following: library card # and password (if you don't know it you can find out at the circulation desk)
