What's Happening in City Council?

The City Council meets on the first and third Wednesdays of each month. September's meetings will therefore be on September 7th and 21st. The City Council meetings start at 6:30 pm and are held in the meeting room at the North Logan Library.

During the two meetings in September, the Council will continue to consider a variety of issues that have been on the July and August agendas including possibly rezoning the land that surrounds the existing Pioneer Valley Lodge at approximately 400 East and 2400 North, completing some proposed changes to the City Center development ordinance, and the annexation of some unincorporated land between 1050 to 1200 East and 2850 to 2950 North.

Other issues that may continue to be worked on, previously listed for consideration in August but now which may be considered in September, include a development agreement for the Ashley Court Subdivision, a subdivision of 5.18 acres into 12 lots on the east side of a new 600 East and between about 2600 and 2700 North; proposed changes to the municipal code relating to methods to ensure subdivision infrastructure improvements are completed; and some issues related to engineering for regional storm water control.

Daughters of Utah Pioneers-Ralph Smith Camp meeting will be held **Monday, August 19th, 1:30 pm**, at the LDS Church building at 1550 E 1900 N in North Logan.



With school started at the end of August, I thought it would be good to remind us of some driving rules that will help us be prepared for more pedestrians and bicyclists on the roadway and sidewalks. We have crossing guards at the location of 2500 N and 800 E, two at 2500 N 400 E, two at 2600 N 200 E, one at 2900 N 800 E and one at 600 S 450 E in Hyde Park. We encourage all children and adults escorting children to school to use the cross walks manned by our crossing guards. Drivers, be aware that when a crossing guard is positioned in the middle of cross walk the entire crosswalk is activated and vehicles cannot pass through it. Crossing guards are trained and required to stand in the middle of the cross walk and wait till the children are up on the curb on the opposite side before they can turn and walk back to their starting position. Be patient and take your time when driving.

Benefits of On-site Use of Storm Water

On-site retention, or detention of storm water is intended to increase the infiltration, retention of storm water, resulting in an overall reduction in the volume of water leaving a property. Controlling and reducing the amount of runoff from a site can reduce the risk of flooding as well as reduce the size and extent of drainage infrastructure. The use of vegetation in sustainable storm water management practices provides substantial benefits for water quality and quantity. Vegetation intercepts rainfall, reducing the erosivity of raindrops. Vegetation increases surface friction, slowing runoff and promoting settling of suspended solids. Root systems increase pore space and promote infiltration of storm water, and the roots themselves help to anchor soil, protecting against rill and gully formation from concentrated flows. Vegetation can also help to remove pollutants from storm water through biological uptake of nutrients.

Target

Water Use Reduction: A city wide reduction of water usage of 15-20%.

Reduction Strategies

Public Education and Encouragement:

- Water users must cut back exterior watering by 15% (ie. users shall water no more than three days per week).
- Commercial, Industrial, and Research Buildings cut back by 15% on all water usage (both inside/outside usage).
- No washing of cars using culinary water at a home/residence.
- No spraying sidewalks, driveways..etc. with a hose.
- No excessive or wasteful watering.
- City's splash pad will be reduced to 6 hours/day.

The City may also monitor water usage through real time water meter reports. If a resident, commercial, industrial, or research related water user is using excessive amounts of culinary water they will be subject to the Enforcement standards.

Pollution Prevention in Outdoor Construction and Remodeling



Construction and remodeling projects present special issues in storm water control and pollution prevention. Heavy rains could easily transfer exposed sediment to local waterways. Exposed soils and the addition of impervious building materials will likely contribute to excessive runoff and erosion problems. Fiber rolls or silt fence materials can be used to protect overturned soil prone to erosion during the construction process. Stacked bags of gravel or sand around storm drains will absorb eroded sediments while letting water pass through. Temporary seeding can be used to stabilize soils in areas that will be exposed for longer periods. Take care during any construction and remodeling projects around your home to be on the lookout for potential storm water pollution problems.

Being on the youth council is a great experience! We would love to have you join us! Applications are available for high school students in the North Logan City office at 2076 North 1200 East.

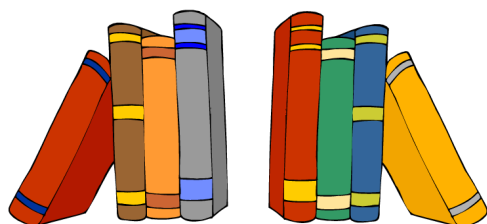
