GOVERNMENT MEETINGS (Agendas: pmn.utah.gov)

The City Council meetings this month will take place on Wednesdays, January 5th & 19th, at 6:30 p.m. at the North Logan Library. In January, the City Council will consider a budget revision to the FY2023 budget. There will also be discussions regarding updated franchise agreements with private utility providers, ranked choice voting, and the finalization of the removal of North Logan Residents from the Hyde Park Cemetery Maintenance District.

The Planning Commission meetings this month will take place on Thursdays, January 4th & 19th at 6:30 p.m. at the North Logan Library. The Planning Commission tentatively plans to hold public hearings or work session discussions on the following topics:

◆Additional amendments to the Moderate-Income Housing Plan to comply with the state-mandated requirements of H.B. 462; ◆A proposal to remove "Small Multi-Unit Storage" and "Large Warehouse-Type Storage" facilities as permitted or conditionally-permitted uses in certain zones; ◆A proposal to adjust the subdivision and development standards in the RE-5 zone. Additional items may be discussed in January, depending on applications received throughout the month.

To stay informed on planning topics in the City, all Planning Comm. & City Council agendas are published at least 24 hours in advance of any scheduled meetings on the Utah Public Notice website (utah.gov). Feel free to create an account on the utah.gov site and follow the North Logan City Council or Planning Commission to receive notifications of upcoming meetings. We also post our agendas on our website and on the North Logan City Facebook and Instagram pages prior to the meetings. NORTH PARK POLICE

As a New Year begins, new goals and resolutions aimed at improving our quality of life come to the forefront. In addition to the common goals that we have all heard before, I would like to recommend one that often goes overlooked until it is too late. In December 2022's newsletter, I suggested that we inspect our vehicles to make sure they are in good working order and well maintained. January would be a good month to continue that effort and make sure our homes are in good working order. With colder temperatures setting in, it is more important than ever to make sure your home can protect your family. These preventative measures can help prevent costly repairs and calls for service.



First, check your heating system. When was the last time you changed your air filter? A sound practice is to have a professional give your furnace an inspection or tune-up. They can perform any needed maintenance to ensure that your furnace functions efficiently throughout the winter. Consider scheduling a chimney cleaning. Regular cleaning is essential for a properly functioning furnace. As you move through your home, check to see if any heat is escaping through cracked weather-stripping around windows or doors. As your budget allows, stock up on emergency supplies to help get your family through a power outage or other emergency. Protect pipes from freezing by placing additional insulation around them. Shoveling the snow after a storm can help prevent ice build-up and treacherous walkways. These simple steps will help ensure your home is ready for the harsh temperatures and weather that is sure to come.

Secondly, as a reminder, the winter parking ordinance is in effect and officers will be citing vehicles that have parked illegally. Please give our snowplow drivers a break by taking the time to park your car off the roadway during the night.

11-604 Winter Street Maintenance-Overnight Parking Prohibited

No person shall park a vehicle on any roadway or city-owned parking lot without it being attended by someone able to immediately remove the same between the hours of midnight (12:00) a.m. and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. of any day, beginning November 1st and ending March 31st of the following year, except health care professionals and/or emergency support personnel during emergency calls.

Also, when clearing the snow from your driveways, please remember that **it is against the law** to push or blow it into the street, as it is a danger to drivers and plowers. Please also be sure to clean the snow from the sidewalks in front of your home for the safety of the elderly, people in wheelchairs, children trying to pass on their way to school, and neighbors walking or exercising. DOG LICENSE RENEWAL

Please remember that all dogs living in North Logan must be licensed. Licenses are due on the anniversary date of the rabies vaccination (i.e., your dog's City license expires on the same date that their rabies certificate expires). The cost is \$15 for spayed or neutered dogs, or \$25 for unaltered. If your dog is no longer with you, or if you have questions about when your dog's license is due, please call the City Office, at 435-752-1310 ext 1. Thank you!!

STREETS

Continuing into January, our Streets Department will be inspecting and trimming trees that are encroaching into the roadway. Our city ordinance has a standard of 12 feet over the back of curbs, and 7 feet over sidewalks. Any branches that violate this clearance space are subject to removal by our crews. If any citizen prefers to do this themselves or hire someone else, that is acceptable. However, our Streets Department will be working to clear the encroaching branches and will not wait for property owners to complete this task.

Snow removal is to be expected during the month of January. Please comply with the winter parking ordinance. It is also helpful to remove any material/ personal property from the roadway.

FLIP THE STRIP

As part of our water conservation strategy, North Logan will be implementing incentives to swap out the grass in your park strip and replace it with waterwise landscaping. Water utility bill credits will be available for participants. Please, watch the city's website northlogancity.org and social media for details in the coming months. Initially, this will be for commercial only, with residential to follow later.

STORMWATER

With winter in full force, please keep in mind the following items:

1. Keep shoveled snow out of the gutter and on your own property.
2. Try and limit the amount of ice melt used to avoid excess entering the storm drains.
3. City crews will plow curb to curb to keep storm grates clear; please assist us in keeping them clear of snow and debris.
4. Avoid storing materials and dumpsters on the road and in the gutter to help keep the storm system clean.

Thank you for cooperating and helping to keep North Logan clean.

SEWER

North Logan City sewer rates are based on a six-month average winter WATER usage (November – April). This is done to ensure that the average water usage does not include culinary water used outdoors in the summer. Your Winter Average is recalculated each year in June, so using less water during winter months by turning off your sprinkler system and watching for leaks, can help you save money on your utility bill all year.

WATER

Water Meter Damage



Our Water Department has started to upgrade our water meters to a new Master Meter Allegro meter. Some of you may have noticed a different-looking lid on your meter pit. It has a round black antenna in the middle of it. The antenna is connected to the water meter with a cable to boost the radio signal with the read from the meter. Removing the lid may damage the expensive electronics of the meter. The cost of repairing any damage caused may be at the customer's expense.

Please see the City's code as follows:

Municipal Code 13A-126-E. *Meters may be checked, inspected or adjusted at the discretion of the municipality, and they shall not be adjusted or tampered with by the customer. Meter boxes shall not be opened for the purpose of turning on or off the water except by an authorized representative of the municipality unless special permission is given by the municipality through its representatives to the customer to do so.*

North Logan Municipal Code 13A-126-H. *All damages or injury to the lines, meters or other materials of the municipality on or near the customer's premises caused by any act or neglect of the customer shall in the discretion of the municipality be repaired by and at the expense of the customer, and the customer shall pay all costs and expenses, including a reasonable attorney fee, which may arise or accrue to the municipality through its efforts to repair the damage to the meters or to other equipment of the department or collect such costs from the customer.*
