STREETS

The Streets Department is beginning to do our spring cleanup with our street sweeper. We are also preparing to begin crack sealing our streets. Please be mindful of our crews as they are out on the roads.

SEWER RATES

North Logan City sewer rates are based on a six-month average winter WATER usage (November – April). This is done to ensure that the average water usage does not include culinary water used outdoors in the summer. Your Winter Average is recalculated each year in June, so using less water during winter months by turning off your sprinkler system and watching for leaks, can help you save money on your utility bill all year.

NOTICE

North Logan City Culinary Water User Conservation Measures Beginning April 2022

Conservation measures begin April 1st, 2022. Exterior landscape watering should be delayed until mid-May at the earliest.

Culinary water users shall water landscaping no more than THREE days per week and are encouraged to water less than three days per week where possible. Priority should be given to trees, shrubs or bushes, flowers, and gardens. Lawn watering should be considered a low priority. Landscape watering should be decreased by 30-40%. Please note that stricter water conservation measures will be implemented as the watering season continues. Check northlogancity.org for any regular updates.

Requirements:

- **ODD addresses are permitted to water on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. EVEN addresses are permitted to water on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays. No watering on Sundays.**
- **Residences that utilize secondary water are prohibited from switching to culinary water for lawn watering for the entire watering season.**
- No excessive or wasteful watering.

Secondary (Canal) Water Users:

Please coordinate with your respective canal head gate/pipeline manager. Further information regarding secondary water restrictions can be found at cachehighline.com, or the Hyde Park Irrigation Company (Twin Ditch Canal) (435) 881-3461.

Notes on Large Commercial Properties:

North Logan is home to many large commercial communities, properties, and HOAs. Due to their expansive size, these properties may need to water outside the designated address schedule to accommodate all irrigation needs. Various agreements have been made to ensure these properties still maintain three waterings, or less, per week.

Written Warning:

If a water user is observed using inordinate amounts of water, or is ignoring the rules and regulations set out in the City's water shortage policies, procedures, and the associated water shortage phase reduction strategies, the property owner will be notified of the violation by a letter, door hanger, and/or E-Mail from the City's Utilities Department. The first written warning will explain that the City has adopted a water conservation program that educates and assists property owners to conserve water. The warning will further explain that the property owner has been observed using more water than what seems necessary, out of the required watering schedule, and, may be in violation of the City Water Shortage Policies. The warning will be accompanied by education materials (or a link to the City's education materials) and tips on how to conserve water. City Staff are also readily available to help identify water reduction strategies for individual property owners.

Violations:

After two written warnings have been given to a water user, and the user continues in violation of the City's water conservation and water shortage policies, fees will be issued. A fee of \$100 will be assessed on the violating user's property. The fee must be paid within 10 (ten) days of the written violation, or the user's water will be shut off. A second violation will result in an immediate water shut-off and a subsequent turn-on fee of \$300. The City Public Utility Manager recognizes that there are special circumstances when a property owner may need to deviate from water shortage policies. The Public Utility Manager will have the ability to allow for special watering when a property owner can demonstrate an extraordinary circumstance requiring more water than is permitted by a particular phase reduction strategy.

STORMWATER

When it comes to lawn care, think of your lawn's possible impacts on the environment. Consider these steps and ideas when caring for your lawn and garden:

1. September is the best month to use fertilizer. When using fertilizer, use slow-release or time-release with soluble nitrogen.
2. Don't fertilize until you have cut your grass a minimum of three times.
3. A common myth is that more is synonymous with better when discussing lawn health. That isn't always the case! Someone should only use two pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. **Two pounds per 1,000 square feet** will give you the best results and save you money.
4. Leave grass clippings on the lawn to reduce the need for fertilizer, and promote a more full and healthy lawn.
5. Spot treat weeds when you can't handpick them and don't douse the entire area.
6. If the forecast has rain or any other wet weather event, try not to spread or apply fertilizer and pesticides.
7. Sweep driveways and sidewalks rather than washing with a hose.

As the weather starts to warm up, keep in mind a few common pollutants that tend to occur. When landscaping projects begin and material needs to be stored somewhere, people tend to stage it in the roadway and sidewalk. Instead, you should find a spot on your driveway, or put the material somewhere on your property. These small steps can significantly impact the drainage in our city and the quality of water we can reuse. Another common issue that occurs as the weather warms up, is the snowmelt unable to be drained. The draining issues are caused by debris in and around the inlet boxes, either by snowplows pushing snow or even ice taking longer to melt. If you notice this happening, please call the city office, and we will be able to come out and fix the issue at hand.

The Cache County Stormwater Coalition is canceling this year's stormwater fair. The Stormwater Coalition will be pursuing radio ads instead. Airing of these ads will be on some of your favorite stations, so tune in!
