# Lawn Water Restrictions for Culinary Users

Water restrictions will be in place this summer for businesses and residences who utilize culinary water for irrigation purposes. Restrictions allow us to meet the growing daily demand responsibly. The watering schedule is currently limited to **3 waterings per week**. Please adhere to the lawn watering schedule:

Odd Addresses: Mondays, Wednesdays, & Fridays ONLY Even Addresses: Tuesdays, Thursdays, & Saturdays ONLY NO WATERING ON SUNDAYS

Residences that utilize secondary water (canal water) are prohibited from switching to culinary water for lawn watering for the entire watering season. Please coordinate your watering schedule with your canal company.

#### North Logan City **2025** Municipal Election

North Logan City will hold its 2025 Municipal Election to elect a Mayor and two Council Members. Mayor and Council Members serve four-year terms and are elected at large.

Dates to know:

- \* Candidate Filing period: June 2-6, 2025
- \* Primary Election: Tuesday, August 12, 2025 (if necessary) \* General Election: Tuesday, November 4, 2025

Those interested in filing for one of these offices must: Be a U.S Citizen at the time of filing; Be a registered voter of North Logan City, Be at least 18 years old; Be a resident of North Logan City for at least 365 days immediately preceding the date of the General Election (November 2, 2025); and not be a convicted felon.

Candidate Filing Period is from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, June 2, 2025 and ends at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, June 6, 2025. Declaration of Candidacy Form or Nomination Petition must be filed in person at the North Logan City Recorder's Office located at 2525 North 600 East, North Logan, UT. There is no filing fee. Candidates are subject to financial disclosure requirements identified in UCA 10-3-208.

## Chief's Message

School is out and it's time to enjoy the outdoors. More than ever motorists need to be aware of kids walking on the roadway, riding bicycles, and selling lemon-aid on the corner streets. Please slow down and allow for plenty of room as you pass. With the warm weather, we see kids on E-Bikes riding on the roadways. Many parents are unfamiliar with the laws surrounding E-Bikes and what is permitted. First off, E-Bikes fall into three classes. Since 2017, all electric bikes sold or made in Utah will have a permanently affixed sticker that identifies the class of e-bike it is, its top assist speed, and the wattage of the electric motor.

Class 1 E-Bikes are pedal-assist bikes where the motor only engages when the rider is pedaling and cuts

off at 20 mph. They are allowed on most bike lanes and multi-use paths where traditional bicycles are permitted.

Class 2 E-Bikes: These bikes have a throttle-assist motor that can propel the bike without pedaling but ceases to assist at 20 mph. They are also allowed on bike lanes and roads, similar to Class 1 e-bikes.

Class 3 E-Bikes: These are pedal-assist bikes that can assist up to 28 mph when pedaling. Riders must be at least 16 years old to operate a Class 3 ebike, and they are often restricted from multi-use paths or trails unless permitted by local authorities.

Riders under 16 years old MAY NOT operate Class 3 e-bikes. Those under 14 years old cannot operate any e-bike with the motor engaged on public properly unless supervised by a parent or guardian. Helmets are required for riders under 18 years old. Kids who pop wheelies and engage in reckless riding behavior will be cited. Riders are expected to follow the same laws as regular bicyclists. This includes observing speed limits on the public roadways. Utah does not require a driver's license, registration, or insurance for e-bike riders. E-bikes are not allowed on the bike park by Elk Ridge Park, nor are they allowed within city parks and city trails.

# What's Happening Around Town?

### Streets

Crack sealing will be continuing throughout the month. We are focusing our efforts on the areas between 200 E and 800 E. We do not plan to have many road closures. Instead, traffic lanes may be shifted to allow for the regular flow of traffic. Please avoid driving on freshly applied crack-seal as it needs time to cure before traffic is reintroduced.

Winter causes a lot of potholes and other damage to the roads. We will be working in various areas around town removing damaged asphalt and replacing it. This will be an ongoing project throughout the summer. Traffic flow interference will remain low while performing this task, however there may be instances where road closures and detours are required. Please follow all signs and any direction given by our personnel.

A crew will begin repainting crosswalks, stop bars, etc. throughout town. Workers will place cones around a section of road to then paint. While the paint dries, our crew will leave the cones in place and move on to the next area. PLEASE do not drive over these cones and through the wet paint. In most cases there should be plenty of room for traffic to simply shift around these work areas and continue as normal. This is a very difficult task and our workers are placed directly into traffic. Please be alert and courteous to these individuals as they work to improve our city

## Code Enforcement

Private sale signs such as signs for garage sales, homemade craft sales, home boutiques or signs for the seasonal sale of agricultural products are permitted subject to the following:

- Such signs shall be limited to a maximum size of six (6) square feet and shall be located on private property at the location of the sales activity.
- Such signs shall not be located within the sight distance triangle. Signs shall not be illuminated.
- Signs at other locations to attract interest to the event may be posted on private property from dawn until dusk only on the day of the sale. Signs shall be removed at night for sales that occur over more than one day.
- The name of the sign owner (or some others person(s) responsible for the sale), their address, and phone number shall be written on the back of the sign.
- Signs shall not be placed on public property or in the public right-of-way.



With the weather warming up, it's time to jump back into the pool! Please watch for hazardous materials entering the storm drain. Remember to keep all chemicals, oils, and other hazardous materials contained. If they spill, clean up quickly. Avoid cleaning with water. While working on cars or other motorized equipment, catch-all drained fluids into a catch pan and dispose of them properly. Following these procedures will help to keep harmful pollutants out of the storm drain system. We appreciate your efforts.

We will be sending out letters and inspection forms to all landowners with retention or detention ponds on their property. Please fill out the inspection form and return it to the city. If you receive a letter and would prefer an email in the future, please send back your email and we will make the update.

I'm seeing a lot of construction going on around the city. What's going on and when will these projects wrap up?

You're right! Our crews are busy on some exciting projects. We've been fortunate to get funding from the federal government, Cache County Council of Governments, and from private donors to make these important projects happen.

**2500 N 800 E roundabout:** we started work on the roundabout in early May, hoping to complete work before school starts in August. This project is funded by a grant of over **\$1 million from CMAQ**.

**600 E (2200 N to 2375 N):** we're excited to add connectivity behind Greenville Elementary and Cache Valley Hospital in this important, COG funded project. Construction on the road and adjacent asphalt trail is currently ahead of schedule and should wrap up in early August.

**1200 E (2600 N to 2750 N):** this master planned road will be an important connection as well. We received COG funding for this project in 2021 and plan to finish construction this fall.

**City Community Center:** Everyone is wondering what the building next to the new city offices is. We're thrilled to add this gathering place to our city! The building will host a library expansion and will be a place where members of our community can use a stage, large multi-purpose room, several conference rooms, a demonstration kitchen, and library areas for their for various activities and gatherings. The city will also be hosting a myriad of programs that are sure to excite all ages and demographics in our community. **The best part: the community center and new city offices are funded entirely without the city incurring debt for the projects.** We're so grateful for our generous donors, Del Loy Hansen and his family. # **Emergency Preparedness**

Utah is a desert, but we still have a lot of vegetation in our wildlands and urban areas. Each year, Utah spends millions of dollars fighting wildfires. Protect your home and family from the possibility of wildfire by practicing simple wildfire safety. Do this to be prepared:

- Make and practice a wildfire evacuation plan with multiple evacuation routes in different directions,
- Keep disaster supply kits updated and ready for quick, easy access,
- Know how to shut off utilities including gas, electric, and water,
- Have a battery-operated radio to receive alerts if power is out,
- Create wildfire defensible space around your home.

Wildfires can happen anywhere, at any time. The good news is that you can take simple steps to stay safe.

- Sign up for emergency phone alerts from your county emergency management. To get registered and receive notifications: register online at: **911.loganutah.gov**. Download the free Everbridge app.
- Have fire extinguishers around your house.
- Keep copies of important documents in a disaster supply kit.
- Ensure your vehicle's fuel tank is at least half full.

Following these tips will better prepare you for any emergencies.
